Administer emergency first aid and assist with the provision of emergency treatment to animals



Overview

This standard is about administering emergency first aid to animals and being able to assist in the emergency treatment of animals.

This standard is suitable for registered veterinary nurses.

You must be able to:	P1	assess the animal's condition quickly and accurately
	P2	assess the risks involved in the provision of emergency first aid to animals
	P3	examine the whole animal to make a complete assessment of its condition
	P4	obtain any necessary additional information on the animal where possible e.g. current conditions, recent history of veterinary care
	P5	prioritise first aid actions to stabilise the animal and prevent further deterioration and pain
	P6	administer first aid to the animal according to practice procedures within the limits of your own responsibility
	P7	monitor the outcomes of your first aid
	P8	inform the qualified veterinary staff as soon as possible about the animal's condition
	P9	assist the qualified veterinary staff in the provision of emergency treatment
	P10	assess the potential risks to health and safety in this area of work
	P11	comply with animal health and welfare legislation and codes of practice
	P12	select and implement appropriate infection control procedures
	P13	maintain your own professional conduct
