Prepare and develop resources to support learning



Overview

This standard is about how to determine the materials you will need and the design options and solutions for learning and development opportunities. It includes reviewing the role of technology-based learning and development opportunities and e-learning systems in the design of materials, including working out realistic simulations and identifying the training facilities and equipment you need.

This standard is appropriate if your role involves designing and producing learning and development materials and preparing the places, materials and equipment you need for learning and development sessions.

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Performance criteria

Develop learning materials

You must be able to:

- P1 agree the learning objectives the materials need to support
- P2 identify who is going to be using the material and what their needs are
- P3 choose materials and ways of delivering learning which are suitable to the subjects covered, learning situation and length of the learning programme
- P4 choose appropriate equipment and facilities which will promote effective learning
- P5 evaluate the potential for delivering computer-based learning
- P6 assess existing computer-based information materials to see if they meet the needs of the learning programme
- P7 adapt materials from external sources, taking account of copyright law
- P8 ensure that learners understand the purpose of the materials and how they should use them
- P9 give learners clear guidance and instructions on how to use the materials correctly.
- P10 ensure that the language, style and format of the materials is appropriate to the needs of the learners
- P11 test the materials and change them if necessary

Choose materials to support learning

You must be able to:

- P12 choose learning materials which are suitable for the identified learners
- P13 match materials to the learning environment
- P14 ensure that the language and format of the materials are appropriate to the needs of the learners and that you use an appropriate way of delivering the learning programme
- P15 adapt learning materials to meet the learning objectives
- P16 produce support materials in a style and format that are appropriate to the needs and capabilities of the learners
- P17 choose and prepare realistic simulation and exercise materials which are relevant to learners
- P18 adapt materials from external sources, taking account of copyright law
- P19 ensure that the materials you have chosen support equal opportunities and diversity
- P20 ensure that training facilities are appropriate, available and meet health, safety and environmental protection requirements
- P21 keep within agreed budgets when choosing materials and facilities
- P22 identify and resolve any problems with the materials and facilities

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Knowledge and understanding

Develop learning materials

You need to know and understand:

- K1 how to use design principles when developing learning materials
- K2 how to assess which materials are the most suitable for individual learners and the learning activity
- K3 how to assess learners' needs in relation to learning objectives and how you will deliver learning
- K4 how to identify possible design problems in using computer-based learning materials, and relating to the:
 - K4.1 learning skills of potential users
 - K4.2 cultural and religious barriers to learning
 - K4.3 other parts of the learning programme
 - K4.4 links with qualifications
 - K4.5 routes of progression
 - K4.6 cost
- K5 how to choose ways of testing the learning programme that is appropriate for the material and the learners
- K6 how to accurately identify costs and timescales for design
- K7 give learners clear guidance and instructions on how to use the materials correctly
- K8 ensure that the language, style and format of the materials is appropriate to the needs of the learners
- K9 test the materials and change them if necessary
- K10 how to identify and avoid common design problems
- K11 how to identify appropriate uses of visual, written and electronic material to promote learning
- K12 how to make the most of different resources
