Operate emergency vehicles



Overview

This standard covers driving an emergency vehicle. This can include nonemergency and emergency situations, both to the scene and returning to the treatment centre conveying individuals with life threatening or non-life threatening conditions. It includes performance of a range of pre-journey checks, including ensuring that the vehicle is in a legal and roadworthy condition, and use of communication equipment.

Users of this standard will need to ensure that practice reflects up to date information and policies.

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Performance criteria

You must be able to:

- P1 disinfect/decontaminate the vehicle and equipment regularly and whenever contaminated
- P2 use appropriate cleaning agents to provide the level of disinfection/decontamination required and wearing the appropriate protective clothing
- P3 ensure that vehicle surfaces are visibly free from dirt, dust and debris
- P4 dispose of used consumables and equipment in accordance with required procedures
- P5 carry out a vehicle inspection in accordance with required procedures, checking vehicle functions to ensure serviceability and correcting/reporting any identified faults
- P6 carry out `cockpit' familiarisation checks prior to driving the emergency vehicle and check that communication equipment is functioning correctly
- P7 reporting any problems/defects with the emergency vehicle immediately as they are identified
- P8 stow all equipment securely and take other measures to ensure your safety as appropriate to the situation
- P9 promptly acknowledge all call-outs from the control/operations room and clarify the nature and location of the call-out
- P10 adhere to the Highway Code and road traffic laws
- P11 drive the vehicle in accordance with the approved system of vehicle control and speed, with consideration for passengers/individuals, their number and condition, and other road users
- P12 alter the driving manner/speed to:
 - P12.1 maintain safety in the prevailing driving conditions P12.2 meet the needs of the attendant/individual
- P13 drive the vehicle without undue delay to the required location
- P14 position the vehicle for ease of access/egress, whilst considering the need for protection of crews, individuals and others
- P15 use audible and visual warning devices correctly, when required
- P16 assess and correctly identify situations where exemptions to the traffic laws are required, and give consideration to other road users and their intended/predicted actions
- P17 use the required service procedure to promptly report any involvement of the vehicle in traffic accidents
- P18 ensure your safety as appropriate to the situation
