Clean furniture, fittings and vertical surfaces manually



Overview

This standard is about cleaning furniture, fittings and vertical surfaces, such as walls, windows, glass partitions and doors. For this standard you do not have to work above hand reach height, apart from removing dust using reach poles. You have to clean the following types of surfaces:

- 1. soft (for example, curtains and upholstery)
- 2. hard (for example, wood, metal, plastic etc)
- 3. glass (for example, windows, mirrors and glass doors)

Users of this standard will need to ensure that practice reflects up to date information and policies.

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Performance criteria

You must be able to:

- P1 prepare your work area and equipment so that you can do the job efficiently, correctly and safely
- P2 remove loose dust and debris first
- P3 choose a cleaning agent and equipment that are right for the surface and type of dirt
- P4 follow manufacturer's instructions correctly when you mix and apply the cleaning agent
- P5 apply the cleaning solution smoothly and evenly
- P6 leave the surfaces dry and free of smears and dirt, when you have finished
- P7 dispose of the left-over cleaning solution correctly
- P8 put everything back in the right place when you have finished
- P9 prepare your work area and equipment so that you can do the job efficiently, correctly and safely
- P10 remove loose dust, making sure it spreads as little as possible
- P11 make sure the surface is washable
- P12 choose a cleaning agent and equipment that are right for the marks and the surface
- P13 mix and apply the cleaning agent according to the manufacturer's instructions
- P14 avoid over-wetting and damaging the surface
- P15 leave the surface clear of the marks that can be reached and spot cleaned
- P16 report any marks that cannot be reached or spot cleaned to the person in charge
- P17 prepare your work area and equipment so that you can do the job efficiently, correctly and safely
- P18 choose a cleaning agent and equipment that are right for the surface and type of dirt
- P19 scrape off anything that is stuck on to the surface without causing damage
- P20 remove the soil systematically without damaging the surface
- P21 leave the surface dry and free of smears when you have finished
- P22 leave the area around the surface dry
- P23 put everything back in the right place when you have finished
- P24 wear the correct personal protective equipment as required for the waste involved
- P25 empty all waste from the bins in your area of responsibility
- P26 reline or clean bins as instructed
- P27 check with the appropriate person if you are not sure if something should be removed

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- P28 remove the waste according to regulations and instructions using the right containers
- P29 handle the waste safely and according to instructions
- P30 make sure that waste containers are taken safely to the right collection point and secured if necessary

- K16 why you should scrape off paint or anything else that is stuck on the glass first
- K17 how to scrape without damaging the surface
- K18 why the area around the glass should be left dry
- K19 why it is important to clean or reline the bins
- K20 how to tell if something should not be thrown away, why it is important to check and who to check with
- K21 regulations and instructions you should follow
- K22 why waste should be taken to the right collection point in the right containers
