

Overview

This standard is for individuals working in public service. It is designed to ensure that individuals are able to plan and navigate a route safely and correctly in line with the appropriate procedures. It also ensures that the individuals know how to make use of navigational aids and information to plan and navigate a route.



Performance criteria

You must be able to:

- 1. follow organisational procedures at all times
- 2. maintain your own personal safety and the safety of others at all times
- 3. identify precision positions utilising available equipment
- 4. collect information to plan a route
- 5. propose a route that meets the stated objectives safely
- 6. confirm your precise location at periodic intervals
- 7. navigate to destinations using optimum routes for the conditions at the time



Knowledge and understanding

You need to know and understand:

- 1. the organisational procedures for planning and navigating a cross country route
- 2. the specification of your objectives
- 3. how to take bearings
- 4. how to plan for contingencies
- 5. how to estimate and measure distance, speed and time
- 6. how to interpret maps, charts or other topographical information
- 7. the countryside code
- 8. the uses and limitations of navigational aids
