

Overview

This standard is about managing scenes and preserving scenes for examination.

You will need to gather information at scenes and contribute to investigative processes. This includes reviewing and defining scene parameters. In addition, controlling and preserving scenes and establishing scene boundaries will require establishing and communicating responsibilities with relevant people. Preventative measures to protect scene boundaries will need to be put in place and maintained during examinations.

Maintaining health and safety, together with the integrity and continuity of forensic materials, is of paramount importance.

There are two elements

- 1 Assess scenes
- 2 Control and preserve scenes

- P13 ensure the scene log is started by relevant personnel to record those who enter scenes in line with forensic strategy

- P15 identify whether others have been at scenes prior to measures taken to protect areas, in line with operating procedures
- P16 agree responsibilities for scene examinations with relevant people
- P17 record all details of scenes and decisions made in line with organisational requirements
