SFJ LG8 Identify and consult on strategy options



Overview This standard is about identifying and developing strategy options, and presenting the case to decision makers.

You will need to organise and analyse information. You will need to engage with decision makers and stakeholders, for example different departmental functions within your organisation. You will need to present the case for the strategy to decision makers.

You must be able to:	P1	identify valid strategy options, relevant surveys and research which address the most significant priority issues and which establish baselines from which performance can be measured
	P2	identify stakeholders, including other departmental functions, who are likely to be involved in and affected by any proposed strategy options
	P3	develop with stakeholders a range of proposed strategy options
	P4	plan and set up methods of consultation which will produce the suitable range of valid opinion on proposed strategy options in line with the purpose of the consultation
	P5	present strategy options to people and groups who are interested and informed, and summarise their feedback
	P6	consult specialists who have valid and reliable opinions, identify requirements, options and key trends, and summarise them accurately
	P7	evaluate feedback against relevant criteria,
	P8	identify conflicting needs of different groups and users including the level of support and opposition:
		P8.1 describe how these needs might affect strategy options
	P9	influence, where needed, other providers or departments, to ensure successful delivery
	P10	set up additional surveys if the information and opinions available are insufficient or in conflict
	P11	assess how strategy options will impact on baselines and how they will affect different stakeholders and circulate the assessment to the stakeholders for comment and feedback
	P12	summarise the results of the consultations, and present the results to relevant decision-makers
